Congregational Care

- Ways to check in (calls, mail, connecting children to older adults).
- Ensure leaders of groups are reaching out.
- Provide resources for anxiety.

Reaching Out to Visitors

- Have a curator of the online worship service to post links and information for visitors.
- Keep a list of folks who watch and are commenting that you don't know or are members of your church.
- Create a digital information card. Post it in the YouTube or Facebook feed and make quick contact. A Google form is an easy way to do this.
- Give your email address for people to ask for information.
- Always introduce yourself and offer ways to contact and give.
